Throughout the year, the Friends provide environmental education opportunities at no charge to residents in the local area who might not otherwise be able to participate in the nature programs offered at Hemlock Bluffs. This may include: individuals or groups with mobility issues, inclusion needs or the underprivileged. The Friends not only pay for the programs, but in most cases provide the educational programming as well. This expands the programming provided by staff and allows staff to focus on the already ambitious program schedule they provide to the public.

With the assistance of technology, staff have been better able to see who lives on the nature preserve. They placed a digital camera, which is triggered by movement, at a location where there is a known animal den and watched who came by. So far it has been a very busy location. Even when temperatures are cold, flower buds are forming on early blooming species of Hexastylis. In less than a month, trout lily leaves will be up, too.



Help Fund Research and Protection of the Hemlocks at Hemlock Bluffs!

This year you can provide input into the Town of Cary budget process and potentially have a positive impact on funding important research and protection of the Hemlock trees at Hemlock Bluffs. Through a possible partnership with the Camcore Program at NC State University, long-term help and hope is on the horizon for on-going treatment and genetic research for the Hemlock trees at Hemlock Bluffs. If the Town of Cary funds an agreement with Camcore, NC State will provide top-notch experts to monitor the trees, apply appropriate treatment when necessary, climb the large trees to assess their health and welfare and collect seed to establish an off-site nursery to create a future gene pool if needed in the event of a catastrophic event on-site. This assistance would be invaluable, but comes at a cost of \$25,000. This amount is less than the Town is currently paying for Hemlock treatment. This new partnership is a proactive approach and is an investment in the future of the Hemlock trees at Hemlock Bluffs. Fundraising Goal for 2017

The Friends' plan to assist Hemlock Bluffs staff in attaining their goal of updating the "welcome film" in the mini-theater in the Stevens Nature Center's exhibit hall. The short movie, created by amateur film-makers within the Town of Cary, is out-of-date and is using obsolete technology for playback. The Friends want to help raise funds to hire a reputable local firm to shoot current relevant film footage in HD, as well as provide current day technology in the mini theater exhibit for playback. Fundraising has already begun. A \$750.00 grant was recently received from the Lazy Daze Foundation. The total project cost is expected to be approximately \$7,000.
